December 2023

Minsterworth Parish Council Meeting

The first agenda item was 'To receive applications for Casual Vacancy and to follow the vote for Co-option'. There was only one applicant, namely Mrs Vicky King, who was proposed, seconded, voted onto the P Council and welcomed by the Chair.

Borough Councillor Jill Smith was unable to attend due to a prior engagement, and no report was submitted because as there was a full TBC Council meeting the following day, it was thought best if her report included material from this meeting.

Finance - November expenditure was discussed, followed by a discussion on the proposed increase in the precept for 2024/25. The precept for Minsterworth (which residents pay as part of their Council Tax) is below the average for other Parish Councils in the TBC area, and at the moment equates to less than £1-00 per household per week. Costs are rising all the time however, and so it was agreed to increase the precept by 10%, i.e. just above the rate of inflation.

Planning

- 1. 23/00927/FUL Replacement of brown painted garage doors to aluminium bi-fold doors. Replacement windows UPVC double glazed windows. Street End Cottage. As this work has already been carried out, it was requested that the application be resubmitted as a Retrospective Application. After the PC meeting TBC accepted that the failure to circulate the application as retrospective was their fault, and the application was represented. No Cllrs expressed any objection.
- 2. 23/01028/FUL Proposed garage with Oak frame and cladding. The Old Beams, The Street. As the proposed garage was below the height of surrounding trees, and its view from the road partially blocked by the existing office building, Cllrs raised no objection.
- 3. 23/00988/FUL application for a variation of condition 1 of planning permission 18/01085/FUL, to revise the layout of Plot 2 by removing a garage to allow vehicular access to the field to the north for maintenance purposes at: Land Parcel 1228, Seven Acres Close. The P Council remain concerned that these houses have yet to be occupied, and that no full drainage plan has been approved, but no reason could be seen to object to the current proposals.

A48 Safety - Cllr Garbutt presented an update on the proposed meeting with the PC, Mark Harper, Highways and others in January 2024. A time and venue needed to be agreed, plus a firm agenda for the meeting. Points to be raised include speed limits, more central reservations to allow safer road crossings, improved road markings, speed camera signs and pedestrian signs along the 'lower road'.

Clerk Mentoring Support - The PC agreed to fund 15 hours of mentoring support for the clerk. **Calcotts Green** and **Ham Green** – The PC intend to improve both Greens, for example to improve access for residents walking around the area, to reduce the amount of weeds, and to establish wild flower areas. One quote had been received to reshape an oak tree, and it was agreed that further quotes be obtained before proceeding with the work.

A GLOUCESTERSHIRE ODÝSSEY – 5000 YEARS OF HISTORY

We do live in a fascinating county, with history stretching back for thousands of years. I found the various 'stones' in the County particularly interesting, I suppose partly because I have visited some of them.

Four Counties stone is on the A44 near Morton in Marsh – this small piece of Gloucestershire 'protrudes' into Worcs, Warwick and Oxford, hence the placing of the stone.

Three Counties stone on the A46 near Marshfield near Bath and set up by the Victorians is at the other end of the county.

The Devil's Pulpit overlooking Tintern Abbey and Wintour's Leap looking over the Wye valley – both beautiful view points

The Buckstone at Stanton – I've been there but did not realise that it had once been broken and was now repositioned and mended.

Our next talks will be Fishing on the River Severn by Matt Hart (23rd February 2024), The Hardwicke Incinerator, (how it works, energy generated etc) and Battle Sites in Gloucestershire – so look out for the dates!

Monitoring what you eat is undeniably more important than how much you eat.

Try to avoid:

- sugary drinks
- juices
- strong alcohol
- fried foods
- highly processed foods

Calorie deficit

A calorie deficit means the number of calories you burn exceeds the number you intake. You may think decreasing the amount of food you eat is an easy way to create this deficit however not only is this unsustainable, but the average woman needs 2000 cal. and an additional 500 cal for men for healthy daily function. The brain uses 20% of the energy we take in for metabolic processes and you burn 75 cal./hour by just sitting still and breathing (that's already 1800cal a day!)

The Myfittnesspal app is a free calorie counter that is easy to use and access on your phone and can be updated throughout the day.



Incorporating exercise into your new daily routine will burn off calories as well as improve general health both physically and mentally. Why not go for a morning stroll around the village by the riverside or a longer hike with your family in the forest? Classes are a great way of motivating yourself to commit and the group setting encourages everybody as well as adding a more fun, social aspect to the exercise.

Top tip! Don't obsess too much over calorie counting, remember it's a long-term journey not just that day, so don't feel like you can't get together with friends and family and eat what everyone else is.

Benefits

Slimming obviously has a range of physical benefits such as lower blood pressure and risk of heart disease as well as improved sleep quality and mobility. It is also shown to improve mental health by boosting confidence and improving mood.

Staying in shape

Losing weight in the first place is already a challenge in itself but maintaining your new body and lifestyle can be just as tricky. Frequent weight checks (not every day!) are useful to ensure you're continuing your new habits but many say that because the initial approach to weight loss was a balanced, healthy diet that it has not been too difficult to keep up.

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TALES FROM THE RIVERBANK

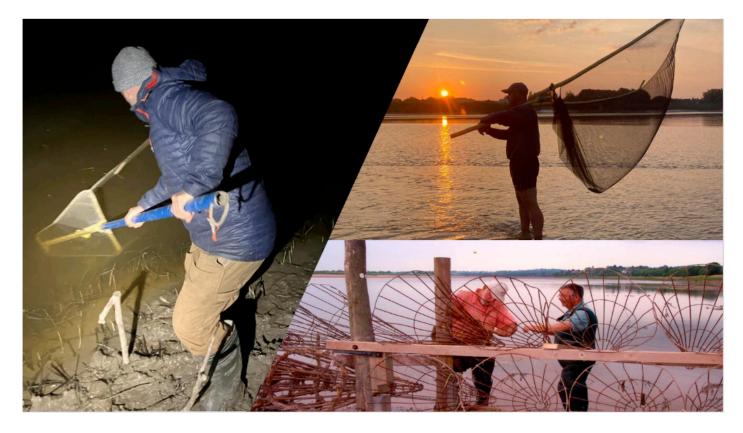
An illustrated talk by Mike Powell and Matt Hart

Mike Powell and Matt Hart have a lifelong affinity with Gloucestershire, the River Severn and its heritage fisheries. Benefitting from generations of experience and a lifetime on (and in!) the river, Mike is one of the few remaining lave net fishermen of the Severn, where salmon and shrimp (amongst other species) are the quarry. Armed with a similar CV, (and a lave net fisherman serving his apprenticeship), Matt's time has been mainly spent in pursuit of the elusive eel and elver.

In Tales From The Riverbank, Mike and Matt aka 'The Alternative Severn Bores' will open the door on the secretive world of the heritage fisheries of the Severn, sharing fishing methods, folklore and importantly, what the future holds.

New year resolutions that will help give you a tidy garden Sharon Ingham

Our gardens will always benefit from bouts of tidying up and there's no better time than in January. Have a good look round and make some well-judged resolutions about what you intend to do, to improve things ready for the coming year. Below are my January resolutions!



Greenhouse Clean my Greenhouse - Frosts, followed by damp, foggy weather has left my greenhouse with cloudy glass that blocks out the natural light. As the growing season begins, I will want to maximise light, so now is an important time to keep my greenhouse glass clean and clear. **Remove Dead Foliage** - Because of the protection they offer, greenhouses encourage plants to hold onto their foliage longer than they would outdoors. This means I have a lot of dying and decomposing foliage in the

greenhouse now. It is a good idea to clear up such foliage as often as

possible to minimize the chances of disease and mildew.

Path Clean my Path – My slippery paths are dangerous, so getting out the jet sprayer now is essential. As long as the ground is not constantly frozen, any kind of brickwork, path laying, or other such maintenance is best done now, before you start getting busy with plants and other garden tasks.

Soil Do Some Digging - If my soil isn't too sodden wet, and where I have some digging or tidying to do, I think that it's worth getting on with it as soon as possible. Continuing cold weather will help the soil break down nicely over the next few weeks and will kill off perennial weeds if you expose their roots.





Fruit Mulch my Fruit Bushes - This is the ideal time to give fruit bushes a good covering with well-rotted compost that will break down into the soil over the next few months and encourage a good crop.

<u>General tidying up</u> Tidy my perennials – I will be finishing off removing the dead or decaying tops, stalks, and foliage of plants from borders and other planted areas. If I leave it too long, my spring bulbs will be in the way.

Write my Labels – Writing labels for new plants and seeds can either make my garden look scruffy because I have not bothered and scribbled them off quickly, or can add a little edge by being neat, or even decorative. So, I shall allow myself plenty of time and write them now when I'm not in a hurry – it will also help me concentrate on what I want to grow in 2024.

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Minsterworth Reading Group

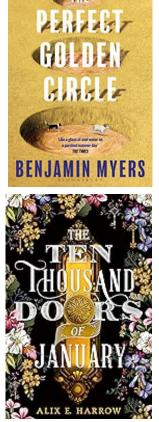

Last month our Reading Group read The Perfect Golden Circle by Benjamin Myers.

Some people took a little time to get into the book, but then found themselves fascinated by the beautifully descriptive writing drawing you into this unusual friendship between two men, both damaged in different ways, living fairly isolated from society. It is set in 1989 in Wiltshire.

Calvert was an SAS veteran badly injured in the Falklands war, who prided himself on living in the second smallest house in Britain. He wore sunglasses day and night, as his eyesight was also affected and he couldn't bear lights. Redbone's issues could be described as self-inflicted, as in his younger years he had travelled Europe with his band, into sex, drugs and rock'n'roll. He now lives in his van, with a casual, though often complicated, sex life.

The friendship between the men is beautifully drawn, especially the way they bond over the planning, design and construction of the crop circles. Both are perfectionists, working only with ropes and planks, building intricate and large-scale designs, under cover of darkness.

Calvert carries out all the logistics while Redbone creates the designs on scraps of paper which they later burn for secrecy.

The book is very much about appreciating the countryside, the crop circles not intended to be seen as destructive. The crops are allegedly gently bent into shape, not damaged. Issues such as lamping and fly tipping are also addressed. Several of us remember the crop circles mystery during the Eighties, with photos on TV and in the papers, and huge debates as to whether they had been made by Aliens in UFOs... this book explains it all.

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Minsterworth Community Shed

Why a Community Shed?

The Harvey Centre is all about creating opportunities for learning, banishing isolation and strengthening the community of Minsterworth. So far, finance has always been difficult but with the Nursery moving in we now have vital funding to secure the Centre financially, allowing us to move forwards with other plans, such as developing the café, creating a community shop and more. These take time to develop but, supported by the Severn Trent Community Fund, we have an exciting initiative to talk about right now - the Community Shed.

So, what exactly is a Community Shed?

The Men's Shed movement (www.menssheds.org.uk) say that Sheds are about meeting likeminded people and having someone to share your worries with. They are about having fun, sharing skills and knowledge and gaining a renewed sense of purpose and belonging. They reduce isolation and feelings of loneliness, allow men to deal with mental health challenges and remain independent, they rebuild communities and, in many cases, they save men's lives. Our Community Shed will be open to both men and women, but it will have a positive impact on men who might find our current activities difficult to join in with. So, it will have a positive impact on all our community – but will help us be more inclusive.

What will happen in the Shed?

The shed will be equipped as a workshop with tools for woodwork, metalwork and more. Members of our Shed community will be able to use this for individual projects and community projects. We hope to run regular "Repair Shops", where people from the Village can bring household items for repair – obviously not large complicated jobs, but many things need simple repairs to be made useful again – we can bring the community together around these tasks and all will be winners – the community, the environment and the "Shedders".

What's next?

The foundations have been laid, the cabin is ordered, next is to build it – planned for February - and begin to assemble the workshop itself, connect power, water etc. We have already been promised many items to equip it. Then we can begin work!
